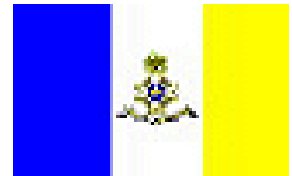

Revolutionary Battles—The Early Years

1774 October 10 - **Point Pleasant** (WV) -- A surprise attack on a colonial militia force sent from the Virginia coast to repel Indian raids was repulsed. This saved many militia for later duty in the Continental Army.

1775 April 17 - **Lexington and Concord** (MA) -- "the shot heard round the world" -- occurred when British troops raided towns near Boston seeking to collect or to destroy the towns' stocks of military supplies. This was the first conflict in which British troops and colonial militiamen shot at each other and suffered casualties. (100 colonists, 250 British)

1775 May - **Ticonderoga** (NY) -- American ranger troops surprised and captured a major British fort. During the next winter ('75-'76), when the rivers were frozen enough to support the weight of the fort's cannon, they were hauled to Boston and used to threaten the British position there.

1775 June 17 - **Breed's Hill** (Boston MA) -- This is usually referred to as the battle of Bunker Hill, which lay to the rear of Breed's Hill and was not the scene of any fighting.

Two British attacks against entrenched colonist positions were beaten back by concentrated musket fire. The third attack succeeded only because the colonists ran out of ammunition. While the colonists were driven from the fortifications closest to Boston, they remained in a dominating position and Boston came under siege. (Casualties: 450 colonists, 1050 British)

1775 Nov 13, Dec 31 - **Canada** -- An invasion force of colonists captured Montreal, but failed to take Quebec. (Casualties: 100 colonists, 20 British)

1776 Mar 17 - **Evacuation Day** (Boston MA) -- After nine months under siege (and shortly after the cannon arrived from Fort Ticonderoga and were mounted on the hills overlooking Boston) the British withdrew from Boston by sea.

1776 July 4 -- **The Declaration of Independence** was proclaimed in Philadelphia, and the war took on a new meaning.

Newsday's site has descriptions of about [twenty incidents](#) involving the patriots, the British, and the loyalists on Long Island.

1776 Aug 27 - **Long Island** (Jamaica NY) -- Troops from a huge British invasion fleet forced the Americans from Long Island and nearly caught the entire American Army.

The British occupied New York City for the next eight years until 1783. (Casualties: 1,000 colonists, 400 British)

1776 Sept 16 - **Harlem Heights** - The Americans successfully defended their hold on the upper portion of Manhattan Island. (Casualties: 150 colonists, 300 British)

1776 Oct 28 - **White Plains** NY - The British outmaneuvered the Americans here and drove them out of New York south of Peekskill.

1776 Nov 16 and 18 - **Fort Washington and Fort Mifflin** NY and NJ -- These two forts across the Hudson from one another were over-run with great loss of life and loss of nearly all of the cannon that the Americans had. Since early October the Americans had now lost 4,000 troops and were forced to withdraw all the way to Pennsylvania, crossing the Delaware River near Trenton NJ. (Casualties: ??? colonists, ??? British)

1776 Dec 26 - **Trenton** (NJ) -- Washington and his troops crossed the ice-choked Delaware River (two American support columns turned back due to the bad conditions) and overwhelmed Hessian mercenaries in a surprise attack at dawn. (Casualties: 10 colonists, 100 Hessians)
